

About the show: As I am nearing thirty, my chances to play Juliet are coming to an end. This is frustrating, as I want to show the world what I think about the character and why I love her, through performance. The solution was to create my own piece about Juliet, and the Capital Fringe Festival is the perfect venue for such an experiment. As the piece formed, the key question was why, exactly, do I love Juliet so much? Beyond just being a great role for an actress, what does she mean to me? The form of this piece changed at least three times during its development, the final time when I discovered that I am not alone -- obsessing over Juliet has had a rich history. No doubt through this initial production I will find more ways to adjust this piece, more ways for it to grow. Thank you for being a part of that process.
